This History which I have just completed does in no way tell all the facts and events of Emerson and Lane Post #132 for the past 30 years. It would be impossible to record here all of the events that have taken place which tend to make this Legion Post one of the many in this great organization known as the American Legion. I have tried to pick out the most important events as recorded in the minutes of the post meetings since that first meeting April 20, 1923. It is my wish that the elder Legionnaires will have fond remembrances as they recall the experiences through which they passed and we of the vounger generation may learn from their recorded history.

As I read the minutes as recorded down through the years, I could not but be thankful that Emerson and Lane Post had gone through its trials and disappointments before we of the Second Great War became a part of it. I can readily see why those fine members of the post as the older Legionnaires are, wish to sit back and let the vounger men run the post. I could not but help notice the number of times Pearl Perry was Chairman of the Commity Christmas Tree Program, or that to Roy Dickinson fell the task of putting together the Annual Minstrel Show, or how many times Don O. Cate had signed his name in the minute-book as Adjutant, that Raymond Libby was ever ready to lend his financial assistance when the post was in distress, how Harold Libby had watched over the post finances for over 20 years, or the number of men who made plans and formulated our present Memorial Day Plans, not forgetting that fine work of Roy Brown in ever caring for the home and all post property. We shall never be able to forget the traditions that have been handed down to us such as the Annual Community Christmas Tree, Our Annual Memorial Day Services, The Annual Minstrel Show, The Annual Summer Fair and the many others that were left to us to carry on.

April 20, 1952, marked the 30th Anniversary of the beginning of Emerson and Lane Post. Our hats are off to those few who long ago had a desire of community service by the Veterans. To those charter members who nurtured this fledgling post through its most difficult year we must say "Well Done". But at this time we must acknowledge the outstanding service to the post that has been rendered by 9 of our Comrades who not only gave of their time and efforts but have made sure that their dues were always paid. Thus for their 30 Years of Continuous Membership we honor you. May I take the pleasure of Dedicating this Issue to the names of Roy M. Brown, Don O. Cate, Leroy E. Distinson, Roy H. Gilpatrick, Raymond E. Libby, Lewis Loon, George H. McMaster, Thomas R. Merrifield and Pearl E. Perry. Congratulations Gentlemen;

I have enjoyed writing this history of Emerson and Lane Post and I am much wiser as to the acheivements of the post in the past and am much better prepared for service in the future. My only closing wish is that this record might be kept up from year to year so that future members may know what has been done before and we who have been a part of these experiences may ever be reminded what we have accomplished.
